

Local Health Department Active Against Diphtheria

Statistics Arranged in City Where Children May Get Toxoid Injections — Dr. Fitzgibbon's Statement

For the first time since 1927, diphtheria cases and deaths in upstate New York failed to decline this year. Dr. P. J. Fitzgibbon, local health officer, stated today. This is as revealed by figures from the State Department of Health, indicating one of the reasons for a special statewide campaign for diphtheria prevention this Spring in which Amsterdam is co-operating.

Wonderful strides have been made in recent years in the prevention and control of diphtheria," said Dr. P. J. Fitzgibbon. "But we must not get a false sense of security from this fact. Statistics at Albany show that, in spite of the low general prevalence of the disease, diphtheria epidemics still may, and do occur.

"As a matter of fact, there have been several small but explosive outbreaks since the beginning of 1933. The majority of these have taken place in the western or southwestern part of the state, but their occurrence has not been limited to these sections. In Albany, Jefferson and Westchester Counties have also been visited by diphtheria epidemics within the past 12 months. They all danger signals, and we propose to do everything we possibly can to keep diphtheria out of Amsterdam.

"We can do it only with the co-operation of the parents and guardians of our young children. The one way to protect our community and our children from this dread disease is use of the simple protective treatment science has placed our command—injections of toxoid. These are given to children between the ages of six months and seven years. For it is then diphtheria most likely to strike and when it does is most liable to result in most complications or death."

During the present anti-diphtheria campaign, the toxoid treatments being given the young children of family physicians or in clinics arranged in the different schools and health departments.
